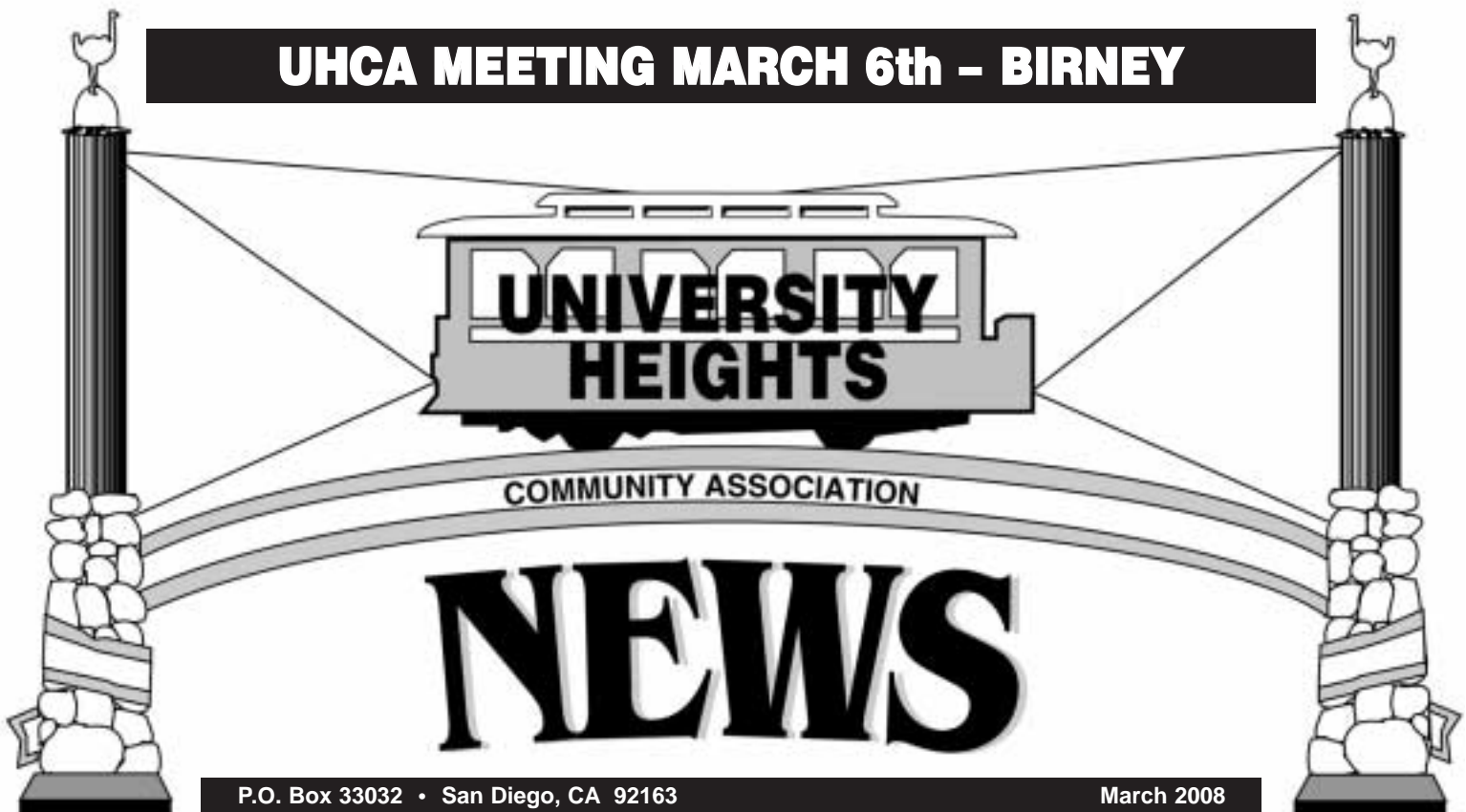

UH LIVING LEGEND PAT EURICH by Chris Proulx

Pat Eurich and her husband, John, moved with their two children to University Heights in 1957. They grew up and were married in Spokane, Washington; then moved to California for health reasons. They fell in love with the home they purchased at the end of a cul-de-sac with a panoramic view of Mission Valley from the back of the house. Pat has watched the view change over the years. It was originally farmland, with Texas Street the only way to drive down to the valley. Her children were able to climb down the canyon to get to a bowling alley that was there at the time.

They enjoyed the peacefulness of the area and were especially happy to have good schools for their children to

attend. Their son went to St. Augustine High School and then state college, while their daughter attended Our Lady of Peace and state college.

Pat and her husband owned and operated the Dye House on Park Boulevard for many years. Dying fabric was common in those days but it was a difficult business. There were not many people proficient in the dying process. The business also cleaned and repaired leather goods. They were successful due to much hard work.

John and Pat were involved in St. John the Evangelist Church. It was a new parish when they were first here and they were founding members. Pat was a soloist in the church choir and

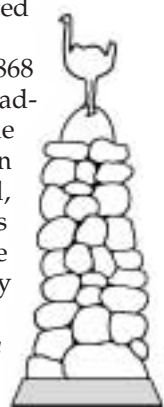
BALBOA PARK IN HISTORIC POSTCARDS

On Thursday, March 13th, at 7 pm at the Grace Lutheran Church in University Heights, author and preservation architect David Marshall will present an overview of his new book *San Diego's Balboa Park* which features more than 200 historic postcards of Balboa Park, most never before published. Marshall dug into his personal collection of over 5,000 postcards to create this illustrated history of Balboa Park.



Balboa Park began in 1868 when San Diego's civic leaders dedicated 1,400 prime acres to create an urban oasis. Originally the land, criss-crossed with canyons and dominated by native scrub, was called simply "City Park."

THE OSTRICH STORY

University Heights, one of the oldest districts in San Diego, is a historic community. Mission Cliff Gardens, San Diego's premiere park during the early part of the 20th century was situated at the intersection of Park Boulevard and Adams Avenue in University Heights. Its Trolley Barn was the destination of San Diego's first trolley line.

Adjacent to Mission Cliff Gardens was the Harvey Bentley Ostrich Farm. In the early 1900's the ostrich farm became prominent due to the immense demand for lady's ostrich-feather hats and garments. The farm was a popular attraction for park visitors who were allowed to ride on the backs of the great birds.

The ostrich is brought back, on these pages, as a reminder of the color and character of our community's proud heritage. The Trolley Barn Park is a beautiful achievement due to the University Heights Community Association. Capturing the style of the original Mission Cliff Gardens, the park was awarded the prestigious AIA Orchid award in 1992.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER *by Greg Sorini*

Tickets, tickets, tickets. No, not for Miley Cyrus. Okay, so I've had a few moving violations over the years. Going too fast in a construction zone, making an illegal left turn over a double yellow line, normal stuff. But I have never gotten a ticket in a car that wasn't moving, in fact one I wasn't even remotely near. Here's what happened. I was leaving for work one morning and pulling out of the driveway in our other car when I noticed something on the windshield of my truck. The truck was parked on the street in front of our house. We call it the "Lizard" because it's green and the paint on the roof and hood isn't in the best shape. (Some of our neighbors may call it something else!) I don't drive it every day, but I'll never get rid of it. It's paid for and reliable and when it comes to hauling plywood or bringing home mulch from the dump, you can't beat it.

At first I thought the paper was one of the "hand written" notes proclaiming to want to buy my vehicle. I hate to have things on the windshield so I stopped to take it off. As I approached, I realized it wasn't a note, but a parking ticket and envelope. Looking closer, the ticket was for "current registration not displayed". I had already registered the truck and had the orange 2008 sticker, I just never got around to putting it on the truck. Fair enough, I could see getting what we used to call a "fix-it ticket" if I were driving around, but they got me while the truck was just sitting there!

There are two ways to look at this. One, don't the police have anything better to do than drive around looking for parked cars with expired tags?! The other, wow, the police are really patrolling our neighborhood. That's the angle I'm taking. I've heard stories of people who have called 911 and gotten a very slow response, or suffered rude or wrongful treatment from a cop. But I've had good experiences overall from our local police. Just the other night when we were walking our pups, a cruiser drove by us, paused at a corner and continued to patrol the neighborhood. A few months ago we saw some suspicious guys going down into a nearby canyon. I called the non-emergency number (619.531.2000) and literally within ten minutes there were two police cars and a police helicopter on the scene.

So what's my point? I guess that we as a neighborhood are on the police's radar. They pay attention when we call and they take us seriously. This comes from being a watchful and proactive community; from keeping an eye out on what's going on around you as you walk, drive or just stay around the house. The police are here to help us, but let's help them by doing our part.

**UH EARLY BEGINNINGS:
THE GRAND STATE
NORMAL SCHOOL BUILT
IN UNIVERSITY HEIGHTS**

After a failed attempt to bring the San Diego College of the Arts to University Heights in 1888, a second attempt to bring an institution of higher learning to the area was initiated in 1898. The site of the aborted College of the Arts was donated to the State of California to build a "Normal School," a state-sponsored teacher-training college.

A Neoclassic Revival college building, designed by local architects William S. Hebbard and Irving Gill, was completed and opened in 1899. The State Normal School was the forerunner of the present San Diego State University.

The Normal School operated in

this location for over thirty years. In 1925, the Normal School was granted college status and, in 1931, was relocated to its present site on Montezuma Mesa. The old Normal School was converted into Horace Mann Junior High School but was demolished in the 1950s to make way for a parking lot at the Education Center between Campus Avenue and Normal Street.

The Teachers Training School Annex 1 Building is the only structure remaining from the original State Normal School on the Education Center site. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1999 through the efforts of the UH Historical Society.

Three other potentially historic buildings are the original Kindergarten Building constructed in 1935 with funds provided by the Works Progress Administration

(WPA) and designed by noted San Diego architect William Wheeler. It housed the school's kindergarten classrooms from 1935 to 1952. Wheeler also designed the building towards the back of the site

close to Campus built in 1936, which housed the Domestic Science Building/Band Room when Horace Mann Junior High School occupied the Normal School Building. The third building was constructed in 1922 to house the Drafting Classroom & Men's Shower and Locker Room for the State Teachers College (formerly the Normal School).

Today, the Teachers Training Annex building is used as a storage facility by the San Diego Unified School District and the other three buildings house administrative offices.

In later years, Balboa Park hosted two successful world expositions: the 1915-1916 Panama-California Exposition and the 1935-1936 California Pacific Intl. Exposition. The unique evolution of the park included occupation by the U.S. Navy, a zoo, a Native American village, and even a nudist colony. Balboa Park also suffered periods of neglect and demolition before citizens groups united to save and restore the beloved Spanish Colonial Revival buildings.

As an architect, author David Marshall has been involved in the restoration and reconstruction of many of Balboa Park's Exposition buildings.

This free lecture, sponsored by the UH Historical Society, will take place in the Fellowship Hall of the historic Grace Lutheran Church, located at 3993 Park Boulevard at the southeast corner of Park and Lincoln. Free parking is available in the lot behind the church. Enter the church from the back alley and proceed through the gate and then the metal entry door into the church. Take the stairs to your right up to the second level. The Fellowship Hall will be on your left at the top of the stairs. LOOKING AT THE FUTURE OF BALBOA PARK

A couple of weeks ago, I joined Mayor Jerry Sanders in front of Balboa Park's iconic Botanical Building to receive a report commissioned by three of San Diego's venerable foundations with philanthropic roots in the park. The report, *The Soul of San Diego - Keeping Balboa Park Magnificent in its Second Century* - provides a snapshot of the park's current conditions and opens a discussion on the future governance

of Balboa Park. The Mayor and I then tasked the Balboa Park Committee, the appointed volunteer committee that reviews land-use matters in the park, to engage the public in a discussion of the report and to provide a recommendation to the Mayor and City Council on the future stewardship of Balboa Park.

Although the topic of the best type of governance for Balboa Park has been bantered about for years, I am grateful that the coalition of three foundations - the Legler Benbough Foundation, San Diego Foundation and Parker Foundation, for commissioning a study that has brought this discussion to the forefront of San Diego's agenda.

Please join the Balboa Park Committee and authors of the study at a kick-off workshop scheduled for Saturday, March 8th, 8:30 am-noon at the Balboa Park Recital Hall (west of Park Boulevard and Presidents Way). At this meeting, the consultants that conducted the studies will present their findings and data sets and answer questions.

The Balboa Park Committee will also present a schedule of meetings over the next few months that include public participation. The Balboa Park Committee has committed themselves to an open and transparent discussion of all the facts. These meetings promise to be vigorous and I invite all San Diegans

to participate. Everyone, including me, has many questions about how different governance models highlighted in the report may (or may not) work for Balboa Park. We must first assess the current conditions of the park then engage stakeholders in a thorough public and open dialogue. I believe our approach to any proposed change needs to be vetted cautiously and thoughtfully, looking at all the pros and cons of each model carefully and how it may impact the many unique aspects of this public facility. Each of the park's myriad of stakeholders should take this opportunity to offer their insight.

I continue to be impressed by the


comments I've received since the release of the report and how so many of us have a sense of ownership for this priceless public resource. It is quite evident we care greatly for Balboa Park and want the best for it.

I look forward to your sharing in-put and thoughts over the next few months. If you have questions regarding the public process, please contact Jeffery Tom in my office at (619) 236-6633.

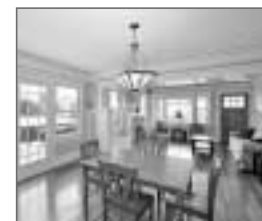

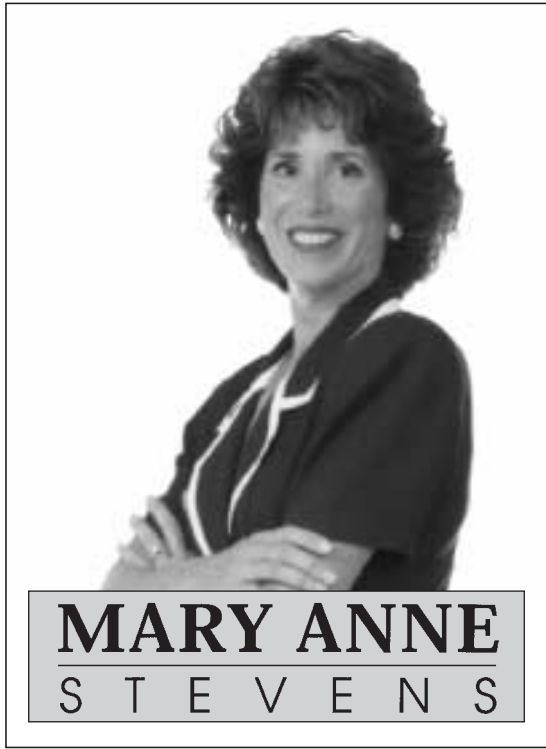
